


# Dear Friends,

The Boys & Girls Clubs of the Los Angeles Harbor has had a TRULY exciting year! We are grateful for the support of our donors, grantors, volunteers, parents, staff, and the communities we serve for their 82 years of tremendous support.

This past January we assumed operations of the former South Bay Boys & Girls Clubs, adding three traditional Club sites and two school sites after-school programs located in our neighboring Harbor City and Harbor Gateway communities. Without this commitment and investment, these 5 youth serving locations would have closed their doors – leaving many deserving youth without a viable option to stay off of the streets or a pathway to a better life. Because of this investment, we grew our title as the “largest Boys & Girls Club in all of Los Angeles County” and we now serve over 2,500 youth DAILY with our comprehensive youth development program. As such, one-in-five Boys & Girls Club youth served daily in ALL of Los Angeles County are now attending one of our 18 operating sites!!!

We are now in Phase II of our \$9,000,000 Opportunity Bridge Campaign which will fund a much needed facelift and major renovations to our San Pedro and our recently acquired Harbor City Club facilities; seed and expand innovative new programming; and launch strategic efforts for major growth in daily attendance serving even more of “those who need us most”. Additionally, we will substantially increase our endowment both in the short and long term (planned gifts) to assure future generations of our most vulnerable youth can access the same quality programs we have been providing since 1937.

Our Club sites not only serve as safe-havens in our most challenging Los Angeles Harbor neighborhoods, they bring hope and practical help to children and young adults who do not need a “hand-out” but rather just a true “helping hand.”

Our College Bound and Career Bound programs, through our individualized case managers, provide important and otherwise unavailable college and workforce pathway support for our members who cannot afford high-cost “college coaches”. The Arts Academy fosters imagination, discipline, and inspiration, improving their mental state, self-image and educational success. Our STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) activities open a whole new world of possibilities for kids who seldom if ever get an opportunity to participate in hands-on technology and engineering related activities. Our tried-and-true offerings of athletic programs are still making a difference in health and fitness of children, with the added healthy eating curriculum and daily access to a snack upon entering the Club and a hot supper each evening.

What we sponsor with the support of so many “investors” like yourselves allows us NOT to be “a typical after school and year-round program.” In the following pages you will find stories of lives changed, of the community leaders, companies, financial supporters, dedicated volunteers and staff making life-changing possibilities every day.

We hope you enjoy our Annual Report – we thank you once again for investing in “equal access” for “those who need us most!”



## Ethnicity



With the shared goals of building leadership skills and preparing our middle school members for the competitive high school Youth of the Year Scholarship Program, the Ford Fund and South Bay Ford joined the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Los Angeles Harbor to establish the Ford Junior Youth of the Year Program. Over 200 middle school students participated in our inaugural year.

The Ford Junior Youth of the Year Program begins with monthly dinners at which a Junior Youth of the Month is selected from each site by our Club staff. These monthly winners are presented Target gift cards by Terri Premeaux, owner of South Bay Ford. Annually the Junior Youth of the Month winners compete in a final speech and interview competition. Local business professionals volunteer as judges and a winner is chosen as the Ford Junior Youth of the Year.

The first Ford Junior Youth of the Year is Nick Velazquez, an 8<sup>th</sup> grader at Wilmington Middle School. Nick has represented the BGCLAH at many Club, donor, and community events including: Terranea Resort’s Christmas Tree Lighting, Phillips 66 LA Refinery Bus Dedication and Maiden Voyage, and the Toyota Youth of the Year.

George Mayer was born in Poland at the beginning of WWII. He is a child survivor of the Holocaust and was hidden by three Catholic families during the war. After the war he was reunited with his parents and came to the United States in 1947.

For the past fifteen years he has been a volunteer at the BGCLAH. His involvement is one of the ways he has chosen to repay those families who saved his life at the risk of their own.

During his time as a long time volunteer and donor, he has supported the Club in many different ways. Initially he was a mentor for high school boys, then chaired the Mentoring Program. For the past seven years, George and his friends supported our Keystone Leadership Conference, which sends a group of Keystone members to the national convention. For the past two years, George has participated in the Career Bound summer internship program, hosting interns during winter and summer breaks at their company, Coastline Equity, which is a real estate advisory firm, specializing in asset and property management. More recently, he has become a major donor in the Club's \$9 million Comprehensive Campaign. He was also named the BGCLAH Volunteer of the Year in 2018!

**Here are just a few:**

For nearly 15 years, Gary Bettis has been devoted to creating a safe environment for all youth. He is the Chairman of the Facilities and Safety Committee at the Boys & Girls Clubs of the LA Harbor. His involvement with the Clubs started in the early 1980's by providing insurance needs and eventually assisting the development department with fundraising efforts. In 1998 Gary was asked to join the Board of Directors, and in 2002 he became President of the Board of Directors. As the organization continues to expand into the Harbor City and Harbor Gateway communities and serve more kids, there will be more than 100,000 square feet of building space the Clubs will be responsible to maintain. From the roof to the electrical outlets and more, Gary's Facilities and Safety Committee oversees it all.

Faithful to the mission of the organization, Gary also participates in various committees of the Clubs' Comprehensive Campaign to raise \$9 million dollars and is one of the Major Gift donors of the campaign. With the Clubs' continued expansion, the need for funding grows exponentially. "It's not like normal businesses where the harder you work, the more money you earn. 


